ANASTASIA'S LAZY APPLE PIE

Everyone has been raving about the wonderful cake Anastasia baked for the Christmas fuddle. So she has shared her recipe.

Mix:

I cup of sugar (250 g)
1 cup of flour (250 g)
1 cup of semolina (250 g)
Pinch of salt
Teaspoon of baking powder
Teaspoon of vanilla sugar
Divide the mix in 4 equal parts (4 cups)
For filling:
Grate the apples (without skin) around 10 apples.
Add cinnamon and Christmas spices,
Juice of half a lemon
Mix and divide into 3 equal parts.

How to assemble pie:

Cake tin round 21 cm

- 1. First layer is one part of dry mix (flour, sugar, semolina, salt, and baking powder)
- 2. Second layer one part of grated apples,
- 3. Third layer is a second part of dry mix,
- 4. Fourth layer is a second part of grated apples,
- 5. Fifth layer is a third part of dry mix,
- 6. Sixth layer is third part of grated apples,
 7. Seventh and the last layer is a fourth part of dry mix.

On top of the last layer grate chilled butter (approx. 100 g)

For baking:

Preheat oven to 180 degrees (gas mark 4) and bake for one hour.

David's links with India and Darjeeling

Most Members know of my interest in old railways and India and were perhaps not surprised at my absence from the November meetings through me getting back there for the first time since the Pandemic. Usually I go alone but this time I took my wife Lyn and my friend Jayne - a designer who worked for me 25 years ago on the early India books and had wanted to go ever since.

My trips to India now include meeting wonderful people who are now friends: Some of my paintings illustrate gifts at the National Railway Museum in Delhi, and a warm welcome is always received there, and other friends that share the same passion for preserving heritage arrange dinners for us to meet up.

In 14 days, I had included four flights, seven long-distance trains (4 hours, 8 hours and 10 hours) and seven hotel check-ins. The end result was two exhausted ladies but ones that had experienced the real India first hand, searching for the right train, arguing with station porters and hailing auto-rickshaws and taxis, all without a cruise ship or tour guides. They had dinner at The Gymkhana Club in Delhi, the Calcutta Club in Kolkata and lunch at The Elgin Fairlawn with my wonderful lady friends 'Pushy',

now elderly but a former Princess, and Nimmi (Oberoi) who owns The Elgin Group of Hotels. In West Bengal it was elephant rides, fording rivers, VIP visit to a large tea estate and dinner with an ordinary family, who's house we got to by motorbikes, Ranjit on his with Jayne, and me riding his mate's bike with Lyn. Pitch black night, dodging cows, dogs, rickshaws and trucks on the main road to Assam - no helmets and no insurance, awesome (although Lyn did NOT see it that way). For me at least, another trip will be planned for later this year - 2024!
