The AGM

Terry Pashley, Vice Chair, opened the AGM as the President Anna-Louise had sent her apologies. Terry remarked how disappointing it was that the meeting was not well attended, and that members should feel it a duty to support their Club. Committee members are volunteers, some of whom have been on the Committee for many years, and others should take their turn. The constitution is already laid out, but participation from the group is needed. Even suggestion forms regarding what the members would like to do or what demonstrators they would like to have, were lacking and it is a shame as it is for the Club members benefit.

Four committee members have stepped down, Andrew, Hilary, Shaz, and Annie. Andrew and Hilary have been very loyal and committed members of the club and were thanked for all they have done. They will be missed. A big thank you to Terry and Sue Pashley, Phyl O'Reardon (as treasurer), Ian Geary and Sharon Maycock who have all volunteered to step up, despite Terry and Sue having both served on the committee before.

After the tea break, there was an open forum to discuss moving forward. Everyone felt that the venue is popular and more suitable.

There was agreement that the annual subscriptions would go up from £25.00 per annum *to £27.00 per annum, due this month (February)*. The subscriptions have not risen for 10 years, and due to the rising costs of Insurance, hire of venues, demonstrators etc, it is a reasonable ask.

Hopefully with the extra revenue we will have more choice of demonstrators, as some of the more popular ones are obviously more expensive.

New venues for exhibitions are to be investigated. The best ones are where other activities are going on producing a larger footfall. Please contact the committee if you have any suggestions.

Digital art is still a contentious subject, especially surrounding original work. It is an ongoing discussion that needs to be reviewed. Again, if you have any ideas or views on this please contact the committee, especially if you are a younger member who paints digitally.

The next definite date for an exhibition is in Ashover on Monday 6th May 2024. Other venues are still in discussion but will need to be decided on soon to confirm bookings.

There was concern that the Friday morning monthly painting sessions were sometimes short on members causing a shortfall in monies collected to pay for the venue. The committee said that the club was happy to cover these costs. Friday morning is a lovely time to start or finish your paintings and is an effective way of getting to know other club members, and to relax and be provided with a cup of coffee/tea and a biscuit.

The Club will continue to have a break during the month of August.

The AGM was concluded - date of next meeting to be arranged.

DJ made a returning visit to our art club on 12 January, after demonstrating his painting techniques before the onset of Covid, at our location at Whitecotes School. He

was pleased to be back and was impressed by our new location.

Some of us remembered his last demonstration when he shared his passion for painting outside, not just at sea level but at the top of mountains! Not a task for the faint hearted!

DJ showed us how he approached painting with oils from a photograph taken of Snowden, quickly sketching out with paint the outlines before starting the detail. He gave tips on how to approach painting and was keen on making mixing the right colour for

the painting. Using his pallet knife, he applied the paint and textures which looked highly effective.

The overall result was an impressive oil painting of Snowden, with extra detail taken to ensure the ridge lines were correct, as he confessed to being a mountain climber too! We finished off with a group photo with his painting in the foreground. A good night was had by all!
