Making Mosaics by Ian Geary

Probably the simplest way to start making mosaics would be to buy a kit with all the bits that you would need. These provide the small pieces, the tesserae, ready made and sometimes already coloured.

If you wish to get the tesserae yourself, these can be got by cracking off pieces from old ceramics like crockery, vases, tiles, mirrors etc. Special plier-like cutters called 'tile-nippers' should be used, (with care! ie use goggles).

I decided to make the tesserae from air-drying modelling clay, eg DAS, from Hobby-craft. This is available in white, terracotta and stone colours.

First roll out a lump of clay to the desired depth of the tesserae and before it starts to dry (in about 30mins), cut the clay into the required shapes and leave overnight to harden. The tesserae can be painted at this stage however I did not as I wanted to paint them later when the design was complete.

The type board that the mosaic is to be assembled on will depend on the ultimate intended location, if this is to be outdoors then waterproofing will have to be taken into account. I have not looked into this in detail as mine were to be for indoor display, so I have used 6mm MDF (Mediumdensity fibreboard).

I did not think it necessary to prime the board but went ahead and made a rough pencil design of the mosaic on it then attached the tesserae onto the board with Hobbycraft 'Mosaic Glue'. When set, I painted them with acrylic paint and then filled between them using white tile grout.

BAMM(bamm.org.uk) is the British Association for Modern Mosaics and is the site for all things mosaic. They have an exhibition 'Piece Together' at the Woodend Gallery in Scarborough, which runs to the 14 November. The exhibition consists of 64 small (30cmx30cm) mosaics on the theme of 'Collaboration'. I was most struck by the very diverse mixture of styles and concepts. Many included 'attachments' that pushed the boundaries of what could be called tesserae to the extremes!

The Woodend Gallery was a most interesting place as it was the seaside home of the Sitwells from 1870-1934. It is a Grade II listed 'Marine Villa' situated next to the main Scarborough Art Gallery overlooking the Valley Gardens which lead to the South Bay.

A living from Art by David Charlesworth

Art has been my interest from a very, very early age, certainly by three years old where I was apparently drawing recognisable aircraft and knew, even then, enough to know that the wings can't be seen in a side view! We had some books on art, but I loved the Thomas Tank engine stories and the illustrations. I still remember vividly the old lending library in Chesterfield and being so small I could barely see over the counter as my Grandma got them stamped. By the age of seven I was attending junior classes at the

Art College on Saturday mornings. At that time the college was at Penmore in Hasland. However, this was the early 60s and the "art" of that time simply did not appeal to me; I wanted to know why I could not draw like Augustus John or paint portraits like John Singer Sargent and why could they not teach me? I remember asking "What is an oil painting" at the age of five. I knew about oil, it went in cars, on my bike and my Mecanno motor, but HOW did you paint with it? The reply was "it's lumpy". It was two years before I saw a real oil painting and understood – it was at Penmore and it was just an abstract which barely helped!

What I was interested in, was art that did a job; it illustrated books, magazines, posters, the back of a cereal packet, an LP sleeve or adverts. Unfortunately these artists were all unsung heros even though they were amazing illustrators. Their drawing and figure skills surpassed any of the contemporary 1960s artists that received all the acclaim. I was also interested in other commercial artists, the figure painters like Degas and William Russell Flint and the man who painted the covers for my model railway catalogues, the Queens favourite artist and my hero, Terence Cuneo. They were all my influences. (To be continued next issue.)
